

3. REDISTRICTING - On Feb 6th, the Board president and I conducted a community regarding redistricting, with 80-90 parents in attendance. I spoke with many of you afterwards to get your impressions of parent feedback. Considering what I learned studying the problem, we will NOT redistrict next year. The staff and I will study student enrollments and class sizes going into and through the summer, and handle it with the FTE that is already in the budget, if need be. Between now and August, we will study the class size/student assignment issue for K-8: considering keeping neighborhoods together, class size, classroom size (Milford versus Strayer square footage), socioeconomic demographics, and building capacities, then after letting you know what we learned, we will work with the community to bring the Board the optimal solution. In the meantime, we will refer a few recommendations that some of you have mentioned to me to the policy committee regarding student assignments.



6. TRANSPORTATION COSTS – At the Feb 6th meeting, a parent asked us how much we spend on transportation. The figure this year is approximately \$3.99 million dollars. Next year, with everything remaining equal, Bob Riegel projects the costs to be \$4.12 million. This is over 4 percent of our budget. Important to note; the state reimburses us some of our costs for transportation. This year, Bob said that it will be about \$1.4 million. You can see the different categories of expenditures, public school transportation versus the cost of non-public transportation (\$1.2 + million). I would think that within these costs, there are efficiencies that can be realized. However, those efficiencies do come at a cost. Some parents may not like a change to bus routing or how we provide certain door to door services. As an example, we spend approximately \$200 k to transport five vans with students that have disabilities and one student transported to a special school. All are vehicles that transport three students or less. This gives you some idea of the larger picture of transportation issues.

The chart below shows the 1st wave of pick up times (left side of the chart) for middle school students beginning at 6:18 am. The 2nd wave of pick up times (middle of the chart) represents high school students and the last wave (right side of the chart) represents elementary school students. The early pick-up time for middle school students is the basis for the two-hour delay decisions on snowy days.
